Ask God to bless His Word to you and then read through the questions to see what to look out for as you read the passage. Reading: Hebrews 1:1-14. Greatness & Glory of Christ Jesus!
Suggested passage to memorize: Hebrews 1 : 2.
1. In what way did God speak to our forefathers in the past?
What superior way has He used to speak to us now in these "last days"?
2. List the qualifications of Jesus Christ that show He is superior to prophets and angels?
 What did Jesus do after having made purification for sins that underlines His words from the cross – "It is finished!"
4. What did God say about His relationship with Jesus Christ that He never ever said of any of His angels?
5. Does Acts 13:33 shed any light on what is meant by God saying "today I have become Your Father"?
6. What did God say about the majesty of His Son?
7. What contrast is made between Christ and His creation?
8. The work of Creation had its beginnings in Christ. How will the created universe end?
 9. Jesus is L.O.R.D. Find verses to support the truths that Jesus is: L Living O Originator R Redeemer D Divine
10. Having had the glories of Christ Jesus revealed to us how does His ministry to God's people contrast with that of angels?

Reading: Hebrews 2:1-18. God becomes man & becomes sin! Suggested passage to memorize: 2 Corinthians 5 : 21.

Study #3/13 of HEBREWS. <u>God's house and home</u>. Ask God to bless His Word to you and then read through the questions to see what to look out for as you read the passage.

Reading: Hebrews 3:1-19. Deprived of the "rest" of "home"!
Suggested passage to memorize: Hebrews 3 : 19.

2. In Old Testament times who was the faithful and respected leader of "God's house" – the Jewish nation?
3. How does Jesus Christ's role compare to the role of Moses in the past?

5. In "God's house" how does the role of being a servant (Moses) differ from being a Son (Christ)?
6. Who is said to be speaking when quotations are made from the Old Testament? Why?
7. What were some of the sins listed against the members of God's house in days of Moses?
8. What is the important lesson we must learn from the experience of the house of God in the O.T.?
9. What steps can we take to avoid the devastation experienced by the original house of God?
10. Having been saved out of bondage in Egypt what else should the house (people) of God have sought?

Rea	ading: Hebrews 4:1-16. Entering God's promised rest now!
	Suggested passage to memorize: Hebrews 4 : 11. Here the experience of Israel's transition from Egypt's slavery to Canaan's freedom is used as a parable – an earthly story with a heavenly meaning. Can you think of any stages in their journey that reflect the Christian pilgrimage? Why should we not consider Canaan as a picture of Heaven?
2.	What did the Israelites miss out on that God had intended His people to enjoy and benefit from as they progressed with God? Which verses indicate that it is something we are meant to experience today?
3.	Why did the Israelites miss the "rest" that God promised and planned in advance for them? Could history repeat itself with God's people today? Give reasons for your answer.
4.	What well known Biblical "rest" is matched with the rest available for the Christian? Is that the only rest that we are being exhorted to enter into today?
5.	"Sabbath" is NOT a word that just means the weekly rest day. Can you identify the special occasions that are called "Sabbaths" in Leviticus 16:29-31 and in John 19:31?
6.	What "Sabbath rest" could Hebrews 4:9 be referring to that is available to us today?
7.	Why do we need to be so very careful in our attitude and response to the Word of God?
8.	What do you learn about the power and purpose of the Word of God from Ps. 19:7-11. & 2 Tim. 3:15-17?
9.	What great position are we told that Jesus the Son of God holds? Why can we be sure of His sympathetic response to our weakness and sinfulness?
