Ask God to bless His Word to you and then read through the questions to see what to look out for as you read the passage.

Readings: Mark 11:12-24. (Matt 21:18-22.) The Withered Fig Tree.

SUGGESTED PASSAGE TO MEMORIZE: EPHESIANS 2:10. 1. Why did Jesus go out of His way to go to the fig tree? "Jesus was hungry" - What does this tell us about Jesus, the Son of God? List any other fact you can remember about Jesus' life on earth that show He was truly human. If Jesus wanted figs why do you think did He not make the tree fruitful instead of destroying it? Can we learn anything from this about how God is going to judge our lives? See Rom 2:5-6. 14:10-12. 4. What was the temptation the devil used against Jesus when He was hungry in the wilderness? (Lu 4:2-4) By saying "If You are the Son of God" the devil was implying that a true Son of God should not have to suffer hunger. Why was the devil assuming that a child of God need never be hungry? Why did Jesus, being the Son of God, go to a fruitless tree at the wrong season of the year and look for fruit? 6.
